FROM WHE BRIDGE

Here we are past Labour Day and starting to wind down the all too short 2019 season. Within the next week the Fleet Captain will begin to mark storage spots in the parking lot and some boats will start to hit the hard for winterization and storage for the winter.



We have had a reasonable year from the perspective of the Executive with only a few issues with and between members. The most frustrating issues have been with guests and guest parking. As a result of members lining up to complain about where guests have parked I personally had a verbal dispute with a member over this issue. Due to this, I reviewed no less than 20 Canadian and US Yacht Clubs to determine how our rules stand compared to other clubs.

Typical rules, either within the bylaws or as regulations at other clubs included:

- · Only full members may invite guests to the club
- · Members must accompany guests on club property at all times
- · Guests shall not park in member parking
- · Guest must sign in at front desk / clubhouse
- · Members are responsible for guest conduct
- · Guest visits limited to 3 times per year
- · Executive may limit any guest visits per year
- · Guests will be limited if creating a nuisance, abusing guest policy or through excessive visits
- · Members limited to 6 guests at any time
- · Members are allow one guest vehicle on property parked in designated area
- · Guest fees of \$15.00 per visit for use of club facilities
- · Member is responsible for damage caused by guest
- · Attempts to circumvent guest rules will result in the Member being disciplined
- There are many variations on these rules at various clubs.

It was clear that we are one of the most accommodating clubs with rules regarding our guests. We have less restrictions than most other clubs reviewed and yet our membership seems to struggle with the few rules regarding guests at KYC. Our rules require that we meet our guests at the gate and have them sign in at the clubhouse. We installed a phone system that would allow opening the gate from the pole phones, but we should still direct the guest to the clubhouse to sign in. Directing your guest as to where to park would also save a great deal of conflict.

Most members, when being interviewed, are interested in the club because it is a private club with a reasonable expectation of security. KYC members understand that this is not a marina, and as such our guests are invited and supervised by the associated member. Guests should not "sneak" through the gate behind a member vehicle. If your desire is to have strangers wandering on the property and having access to our boats, join a marina. Guests must respect that this is a private club.

I nor this executive are promoting becoming as stringent as many clubs are, however, we do need to adhere to our bylaws, rules and regulations. We all accepted them when we joined the club. If we as full members disagree with a bylaw or regulation, there is a process in the bylaws for change. Don't complain, propose a solution. If the membership votes in favour of change it will be, but if voted down you are expected to accept that democratic result.

After three years as Commodore I am very satisfied with the accomplishments of this executive. I would recommend the next Commodore limit him/her self to 2 years. I will comment more before November's election on the success that we have had as an Executive and trust that we can close this term without any further social issues. From a business perspective, the club is being passed on to the new lead in good health and positioned for success going forward. That was the goal!




KYC MEMBERS CRUISE

The cost to move our boats from KYC to the Trent Severn water way would be excessive, both by transportation by flat bed or water passage and the amount of gas needed. So **Ralph and Lynn Oliver** and **Brian and Donna Knowles** decided to take their dinghies and drive to the waterway. This was much cheaper and time sensitive. We left bright and early on a Monday, planning to venture out on the water for four days. We booked accommodations at **Gordon's Yacht Harbour**, in a two level floating boathouse in the town of Bobcaygeon. Lock 32 is located in the town of Bobcaygeon, and Gordon's is a stopping spot for boats looking for overnight accommodations or fuel to continue their trip. This was a great location for us to dock our dinghies and prepare for day trips onto Pigeon Lake to the east and south on Sturgeon Lake to the west and north. While the ladies shopped in the morning Ralph and I sat at the dock and spoke with people basically from all over the world who were doing the "LOOP". Now that is a boat trip!













This was our individual floating accommodations. It consists of two bedrooms, kitchen, living/dining area and two bathrooms. Mornings can be spent sitting on the front deck and swimming off the deck in the crystal clear water.

Talk about calm waters. This was our view looking northwest from the deck. Even when a breeze did come up you could still go boating

The **Great Loop** is a continuous waterway that recreational mariners can travel that includes part of the Atlantic, Gulf ntracoastal Waterways, the **Great** Lakes, Canadian Heritage Canals, and the inland rivers of America's heartland. Anyone who completes the journey is then named an official 'Looper.'







Bobcaygeon, provides a wide range of restaurant accommodations on the water and in the downtown area of the town.



Downtown Bobcaygeon is a very attractive area, with a wide range of shopping and eating establishments, including the world famous "BIGLEYS" department store.



Bobcaygeon is a great boating area, so the second day, we set out to travel east into **Pigeon Lake**. This is a rather large lake providing access to **Buckhorn**, and is surrounded by cottages, homes, mansions and the odd marina. There is really not very much to see from a dinghy and the passage is somewhat slow. Returning to home base, it was time for a swim and then head out for dinner. The big adventure was to be the next day when we tackled Lock 32.

We woke up the next day to another marvelous sunrise and headed to the **Eggsmart** restaurant for breakfast and get ready to tackle Lock 32 and the canal system leading to **Fenelon Falls.** We readied the dinghies for the trip, fueled up and headed for the Blue Line to await our turn to enter the lock. Moving into the lock, we looped our ropes around the guide lines and waited for the lock personnel to greet us and collect the passage fee. The young girl asked if we had a boat number, which we didn't due to the size of the craft and the engine horse power. Without the number, she gave us free passage for both directions—great deal. The water came in and we went up and out of the lock and on our way to Fenelon Falls. The trip is approximately 13 miles one way. It is a picturesque journey with a wide range of cottages, mansions and marinas located on the shores. Coming into Fenelon Falls you are greeted by Lock 34 a much higher elevation than the one we had just left. We docked the dinghies along a free sea wall and headed downtown for lunch. Fenelon Falls is larger and not as attractive as Bobcaygeon, although it is a major stopping point for travelers on the Trent Severn waterway. We took in all the sites of the town and then headed back to Lock 32. It was a very hot day and the waterway was calm for travelling.

I can tell you that travelling a total of approximately 26 miles on the tube of a 10 foot dinghy will provide you with a bad case of "Dinghy Butt".

The weather was perfect for our trip, and the people in the area were very friendly and eager to help with questions or directions.

This was a great way to experience locks and a part of the Trent Severn waterway, without having to move your boat at great expense. If you are interested in doing a trip like this we would be happy to provide you with information or just go ahead and hook up the trailer and head north—stay off 401. **Happy Boating**......
